diēs, diēī <i>m.</i> or <i>f.</i>	day; <i>fem.</i> used when it is an appointed or set day
domus, domūs <i>f.</i>	house(hold), home
exercitus, exercitūs <i>m.</i>	army
faciēs, faciēī <i>f.</i>	face; appearance
fidēs, fideī <i>f.</i>	faith, trust; loyalty, trustworthiness
flūctus, flūctūs <i>m.</i>	wave; commotion
genū, genūs <i>n.</i>	knee
impetus, impetūs <i>m.</i>	attack; charge; impulse
manus, manūs <i>f.</i>	hand; band (of men)
metus, metūs <i>m.</i>	fear, dread; anxiety
passus, passūs <i>m.</i>	pace, footstep
mille passūs; milia passuum (pl.)	mile ( <i>lit.</i> “1000 paces”); miles
rēs, reī <i>f.</i>	thing, matter, business; court case
rēs pūblica, reī pūblicae <i>f.</i>	state, republic

spēs, speī <i>f.</i>	hope
vultus, vultūs <i>m.</i>	expression; face
